Because of your generosity, hundreds of families in Karatu, Tanzania, are rising out of poverty and walking in hope. Through goats, gardens, and the Gospel, lives are being transformed every single day.

Together last year, we:

- · Equipped 576 families with livestock, mentoring, and faith-based training
- · Empowered over 1,500 children to attend school, eat well, and thrive
- · Shared the Gospel with more than 21,000 people across Karatu
- · Reached over 180,000 listeners with teachings on vertical farming and selfreliance
- · Strengthened our staff and community leaders through powerful discipleship gatherings

And yet—we know there's still more to do. In 2025, we are turning our focus toward refining our impact. We're taking time to evaluate our programs more deeply, looking for ways to help families bear fruit faster—so they can break free from cycles of poverty, stop striving, and step fully into God's plans for their lives.

God willing, we will complete construction of the creamery and fully open our Farm and Innovation Center—offering immersive visitor experiences, sustainable tourism packages, and even greater community impact by the end of 2025.






### Our vision

### Worth the cost

Food for His Children, we are called to serve families living in ultra poverty—those whom the world often overlooks or deems too hard to reach. These families are beyond what's typically defined as extreme poverty. They live in remote villages, often surviving on less than 70 cents per day, facing not only material lack but also deep spiritual, emotional, and relational brokenness.

We meet them at the hardest point in their journey—not just lacking income, but lacking hope. Many organizations say they're too poor, too isolated, or too complex to serve. But we choose them—because every single one is a priceless child of God. Christ already paid the price. No one should ever be told they're not worth the cost.

We believe with every ounce of who we are that God has a place for them. He sees them. He loves them. He never intended for them to be alone, hurting, or in desperation. That's why we go. That's why we stay. And that's why we walk with them—step by sacred step—until restoration takes root.

## Restoring what was broken

#### How Food for His Children Heals Poverty Through Relationship

Poverty is more than the absence of money. It's about broken relationships—with God, self, others, and creation. Our work is rooted in restoring these relationships to bring holistic transformation to families living in extreme poverty.

When a mother sees herself as valuable, her children as a blessing, and her land as a gift to steward, she begins to rise. That's why we don't just give out goats or teach business skills—we invest in people, walk alongside them, and help them rediscover dignity, purpose, and hope.

Transformation is slow and sacred—but we've seen it. And with your help, we're walking with families in extreme poverty—every step of the way.



Restoring Relationship with God — Healing Spiritual Poverty
Through discipleship, pastoral care, Bible studies, and Christian outreach, families learn they are known, loved, and made for a purpose. This spiritual foundation becomes the bedrock of transformation.

Restoring Relationship with Self — Overcoming Emotional & Personal Poverty
Through Case Management and Goal Planning, families begin to dream again. Families receive coaching, set life goals, and participate in Street Business School and skills training. ### Where hope takes root

#### Suzanna's Story: From Desperation to Dignity

# WHEN

we first met Suzanna, she welcomed us with the biggest smile you can imagine. Her

joy was radiant—shining through the pain she'd carried, the trauma she'd endured, and the burdens she still bore. That day, she told us her story from the edge of her small brick home in a remote Tanzanian village, miles down a dusty, rugged path lined with goat and cow traffic jams, young children guiding livestock

barefoot across dry earth.
What she shared was hard
to hear—but harder still to
imagine living through.
Her husband had given
her an ultimatum: leave, or
he would hurt the children.
Suzanna made the only choice
a mother could. She fled with

the youngest two and left the older boys behind—hoping to return for them quickly. But the boys ran away to find her. They were just 7 and 9 years old, wandering through town trying to board a bus with no money, no adults, and no one who believed them. When they were turned away, they tried to survive on the streets—hauling goods, begging for food, doing whatever they could.

They eventually split up. One son returned. The other, Gerson, has never been seen again.

She lost a child in order to save the others. And yet—Suzanna's story didn't end there.

#### Finding Her Way Back

After years of heartbreak, isolation, and abuse, Suzanna returned to Karatu

determined never to leave her children again. She tried to reconcile with her husband for the sake of her family, but the pattern repeated—broken promises, more violence, and finally, abandonment. He left her with nothing.

But Suzanna still had one thing: her faith.
She prayed. She pressed on. And then she connected with Food for His Children.
She was hesitant at first—building her own goat shed by hand after her husband refused to help. When her first goat died, she didn't

### Rebuilding Her Life, One Braid at a Time

When we sat with Suzanna under a shady tree, she began braiding my hair—laughing, smiling, talking about her dreams.

It wasn't just about style; it was about healing. This wasn't a salon. There were no dryers, no mirrors, no polished tools—just gifted hands and a heart that had been through the fire.

She never used to charge for her braiding. "I thought I wasn't good enough," she said. But her case manager, Loveness, saw the gift and gently encouraged her to try. Just 500 Tanzanian shillings at first. Then 1,000. When the women in her village didn't hesitate to pay, Suzanna lit up:

#### "See? The plan worked!"

Today, Suzanna has more customers than she can handle. On weekends, 7–10 women come to her small home for appointments she now books in advance. She's learning to track expenses and grow her business through FFHC's Street Business School. And she's launched a second business—selling vegetables—while preparing her land to begin vertical gardening.

#### From Invisible to Influencer

Not long ago, Suzanna felt like a burden. Her friends disappeared when she had nothing. People avoided her. But now? Neighbors visit. Customers line up. And Food for His Children selected her as a Farmer Motivator—a leader and role model in her community.

She's gone from isolated to influential. From unseen to empowered. From barely surviving to joyfully thriving. And she gives God all the glory.

"I'm not successful yet," Suzanna says, "but

I've changed. I've been through so much—and now I can put food on the table. I can care for my children. I have peace of mind. That's success."

#### The Journey Isn't Over

Suzanna still has dreams. She wants to expand her salon business. To grow fresh vegetables year-round through vertical farming. To help others in her village do the same.

And most of all—she still hopes and prays to find her missing son.

Her story is still being written. And because of generous partners like you, she isn't writing it alone.

#### \$75/month Family Partnership

equips an entire household with discipleship, case management, goat and agriculture training, business skills, savings groups, and access to health insurance—supporting families as they work toward lasting transformation.

#### \$21/month Child Partnership

provides the resources a child needs to grow strong in body, mind, and spirit. This includes health care, spiritual mentorship, nutrition support, school supplies, and tools that help their family create stability at home.

You don't have to go to Tanzania to walk with a family or child on their journey out of poverty. You just have to say yes.

Because the greatest impact isn't just the services—it's the mutual encouragement, faith, and dignity that grow through genuine relationship. In these partnerships, transformation flows both ways.

One such partnership began with a simple step of faith—and grew into a friendship that changed two lives...

### Meet agatha and holly

#### Walking Together in God's Story of Restoration

"To have faith is to be sure of the things we hope for, to be certain of the things we cannot see." Hebrews 11:1 (GNT)

Something stirred deep in Holly's spirit—an undeniable tug that she couldn't ignore. She didn't know what it meant yet, but she knew she had to follow it.

In 2022, that yes led her across the world to the hills of Karatu, Tanzania, where she met a woman named Agatha.

Agatha's name had stood out to Holly before she ever saw her face. Out of the many family stories she had read in preparation for her trip, it was Agatha's that lingered in her heart. So when she saw Agatha's name on her family visit list, she knew God had orchestrated something special.

"I can't...carry the full weight of her needs forever," Holly says. "But I can be a catalyst for change... As she grows in confidence and capability, my role shifts—but our connection remains, because of our God and His divine connections."

What she didn't expect was the depth of hardship she would encounter. When Holly and her teammate Christine arrived at Agatha's home with field officer Loveness, they were met with overwhelming need.

Agatha was gravely ill. Her children were also sick. Even the goat—a key part of Food for His Children's program—was struggling, unable to nurse

its newborn. Agatha's home, a failing mud-stick structure, was close to collapsing. Because of his choices, her husband was taken from the family without hope of return, leaving Agatha alone to care for six daughters under the crushing weight of stigma and poverty.

And yet, in that space of suffering, something sacred happened: connection. Holly prayed with Agatha. She listened. She stayed. And somewhere in that quiet presence, a deep

# SOMETIMES

a simple yes to God opens the door to a lifechanging journey.

For Holly, that moment came during a Mother's Day message at her church in Minnesota, when Kerrie from Food for His Children shared stories from Tanzania. friendship took root.

Later, the community rallied. With guidance from Food for His Children, neighbors came together to help rebuild Agatha's home. And still, God was not finished.

When Holly returned in 2024, she was desperate to see Agatha again—to know how she was holding up. What she found was a mother still weary, with little access to consistent work or food. The weight of survival showed in her eyes. Holly felt paralyzed by the need.

"I couldn't see a way out," Holly later recalled. "It was all too much. Too overwhelming. My mind spun as I tried to prioritize what needed to happen first."

But a fellow FFHC ministry team member asked a simple question: "Can you sew?" It was enough to spark something. A vision. A possibility. A lifeline.

Today, Agatha is enrolled in sewing school, supported by Holly through a family partnership. Her village does not have a seamstress—a trade that is both valuable and sustainable in Tanzania. For Agatha, this is not just skill development. It's dignity. It's provision. It's hope.

And for Holly, it's transformation too.

"I can't—and shouldn't—carry the full weight of her needs forever," Holly says. "But I can be a catalyst for change, helping her build a foundation for long-term stability. As she grows in confidence and capability, my role shifts—but our connection remains, because of our God and His divine connections."

Holly plans to return to Tanzania in October to celebrate Agatha's graduation—with joy, with tears, and with the kind of celebration that shows a village what's possible when one woman dares to hope again.

Even their relationship with creation is restored, as they begin to see farming, work, and provision as part of God's good design (Genesis 2:15). Faith doesn't just shape beliefs—it changes lives, restores dignity, and offers a new identity rooted in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17). The Gospel truly is good news for the whole person.



#### MILESTONES ON THE PATH TO FLOURISHING

#### Tangible progress in restoring what poverty has broken

These indicators reflect real transformation—not just in income, but in dignity, stability, and hope. As families begin to thrive, we see the restoration of their **relationship with self**, as they discover they are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14). **Relationships with others** are strengthened through coaching, mentoring, and community support, echoing the call to "carry each other's burdens" (Galatians 6:2). Improved housing, hygiene, and health reflect a renewed **relationship with creation**, as families learn to steward their homes and land (Genesis 2:15). And as they recognize God's provision in their daily lives, their **relationship with Him** is deepened—trusting that "my God will meet all your needs" (Philippians 4:19). These numbers aren't just outcomes—they're signs that wholeness is being restored and poverty is leging its grip.



Good health and nutrition are the foundation for escaping poverty. When children are sick, they miss school — and in places without books or online access, missed lessons often mean missed futures. One failed exam can end a child's education. For adults, illness means no income, and choosing between food, medicine, or school fees. In extreme poverty, health isn't just personal — it's survival, opportunity, and hope.



Our goats are more than milk—they're a path out of poverty.

A goat is more than a gift—it's a tool God uses to restore what poverty has broken. It provides milk for nourishment, offspring for income, and fertilizer for farming, but its true value is in how it helps heal the four broken relationships. As families care for their animals and land, they step into their role as stewards of creation (Genesis 2:15). Their relationship with self is renewed as success brings dignity and purpose (Psalm 139:14). Goats are shared and passed on to others, strengthening community bonds and restoring relationship with others (Acts 2:44–45). And through every provision, families are reminded of God's faithfulness—deepening their relationship with Him as the ultimate provider (Philippians 4:19). One goat. Four relationships. A path out of poverty—by God's design.






#### **CLIMATE-SMART AGRICULTURE**

#### Growing food, faith, and financial resilience

Sustainable and climate-smart agriculture does more than grow food—it heals what poverty has broken. As families learn to steward their land wisely, they begin to restore their relationship with creation, living out God's call to "work it and take care of it" (Genesis 2:15). In seeing barren soil produce life, their relationship with self is renewed—they recognize their God-given ability to provide and thrive (Isaiah 55:10–11). Sharing harvests and knowledge strengthens their relationship with others, echoing the early church where "they shared everything they had" (Acts 4:32). And as they give thanks for each harvest, their hearts turn upward—restoring their relationship with God, the ultimate provider (Psalm 104:14). Every seed planted is an act of faith. Every harvest, a witness to redemption.







#### From classroom to commerce

Entrepreneurship training and income-generating activities are restoring families' relationship with self, as they discover they are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14)—capable, creative, and called to steward resources with purpose. As they launch businesses and join cooperatives, their relationship with others grows through shared effort and mutual support, living out the truth that "two are better than one" (Ecclesiastes 4:9). With a foundation in faith, they begin to view their work as worship—restoring their relationship with God by using their gifts for His glory (Colossians 3:23). Every product sold, every shilling saved, is a testimony to what's possible when brokenness is exchanged for God's redemptive hope.



#### **SAVINGS GROUPS**

#### Financial resilience is a key outcome



Savings groups do more than build financial resilience—they build trust, dignity, and community. As families save and lend together, they restore their relationship with others, forming deep bonds of mutual support and accountability (Ecclesiastes 4:9-10). With every deposit, members grow in confidence and stewardship, restoring their relationship with self as they recognize their ability to plan for the future (Proverbs 21:20). These groups also model God's design for interdependence—where needs are met through shared responsibility and generosity (Acts 2:44-45). It's not just money that's growing—it's hope, stability, and a vision for what's possible when we walk in restored relationships.

#### **FARM & INNOVATION CENTER (FIC)**

#### A hub for training, innovation, and impact

The Farm & Innovation Center is more than a training site—it's a living testimony to what's possible when brokenness is met with hope. Here, FFHC families, community members and visitors from around the world experience practical solutions and biblical principles woven together. As they learn to care for animals, grow crops vertically, and steward land with excellence, their relationship with creation is renewed (Genesis 2:15). Side by side with others, they grow in trust, generosity, and shared purpose—restoring their relationship with others (Acts 4:32). Hands-on learning builds confidence and dignity, helping individuals rediscover their identity and value—healing their relationship with self (Ephesians 2:10). And through every teaching, tour, and training, hearts are pointed back to the Creator who provides it all—restoring relationship with God and inviting others into His redemptive story (Psalm 24:1). The FIC is more than a farm—it's a seedbed for transformation.

# WHEN

you partner with a child or family through Food for His Children, you're not just giving support you're building

something eternal: a relationship.

Years ago, my family partnered with two sisters in Tanzania— Neema and later, Nabana. That connection made us family with their mother, Ngasera, and siblings, including a little boy named Shamburi.

I still visit them regularly. Every time I arrive, Shamburi smiles wide and says: "Thank you for being part of our life."

But there's another relationship that shaped him. As a child, he had a sponsor—a boy his age from another country. They exchanged notes, photos, and glimpses into each other's worlds. Simple letters, powerful impact.

Last year, outside his mud-and-stick home in the Maasai Mara, Shamburi pulled out a tattered letter; faded, soft with time. Inside was a photo and a note about a home near a lake in Indiana.

Nearly two decades later, he still treasures that letter. Still remembers that friend. Still hopes to reconnect.

"Do you know him?" he asked. "Can you help me find him?"

That's the power of true relationship. It outlasts programs. It goes beyond aid. It becomes part of your story.

This is why we created the Child and Family
Partnership Program—to build bonds that
transform lives. When you partner with a family,
you're not just sending support—you're

#### THE CREAMERY

2025, we hope to break ground on one of the most exciting parts of our long-term vision: the Food for His Children Creamery. This will be more than just a building—it will be a place of opportunity, training, and transformation. Designed to process goat milk into cheese, yogurt, and gelato, the creamery will help families turn the milk from their goats into a sustainable income stream—while also serving as a training hub in dairy processing and agribusiness.

We'll build it the Tanzanian way: step by step, brick by brick, as God provides. We'll lay the foundation first. Then, as funds come in, we'll raise the walls, install equipment, and bring this dream to life—just like our families do when building their own homes.

When complete, the creamery will serve as a vital income-generating project for FFHC and a tool to help families rise out of poverty with dignity and purpose. It will reflect everything we believe: stewardship, sustainability, and God's provision, unfolding one faithful step at a time.
